2024 Winter Storm Emergency - Weekly Temporary Lodging Summary - Unincorporated


A major flooding event occurred on January 22, 2024 in San Diego County. Through a region-wide damage self-report survey, 211, the County and City Local Assistance Centers, Emergency Temporary Intake Process, and calls, there were about **1,000 initial reports of property damage or other type of storm impact** to residential and commercial locations in the Unincorporated Areas. Of those, **72 residential locations were classified as major damage**, about **290 were renters**, and **770 were owners**. This report summarizes the current status of **112** households or cases managed by Equus (County contractor) and the County in the Unincorporated Areas of San Diego County.


Summary

- There are 45 households from the unincorporated areas placed in emergency temporary lodging as of April 15, four fewer than last Monday.
- Five currently placed households have no record of a FEMA application as of Monday, April 15.
- As of April 15, about \$4.8 million was awarded by FEMA in the unincorporated areas, of which about \$200,000 went to 21 currently placed households.



- Received assistance = FEMA assistance includes rental assistance, home repair, etc.
- Applied but no assistance indicated = may be a temporary status, such as not yet processed by FEMA or lack of documentation, or the household may not be eligible.
- No record of application = may be due to inability to match the records or households may not have applied due to miscommunication, hesitancy to contact government, etc.





*Left the program due to own choice or no longer eligible. Rarely, for non-violent offenses, one warning is given for the first Code of Conduct violation and households are asked to leave if there is a second violation.

Disclaimer: This is a snapshot of rapidly changing data. Numbers are subject to change as duplicate records are identified and household composition changes.
