## 2024 Winter Storm Emergency - Weekly Temporary Lodging Summary - City of San Diego


A major flooding event occurred on January 22, 2024 in San Diego County. Through a region-wide damage self-report survey, 211, the County and City Local Assistance Centers, Emergency Temporary Intake Process, and calls, there were about 2,600 initial reports of property damage or other type of storm impact to residential and commercial locations in the City of San Diego. Of those, 431 residential locations were classified as major damage, about 1,265 were renters, and about 1,249 were owners. This report summarizes the current status of 908 households or cases managed by Equus (County contractor) and the County in the City of San Diego.

## **Summary**


- The majority of placed households are from the City of San Diego: 641 (81%) of 796 total placed households.
- 109 households have applied to FEMA since last Monday; 159 households have no record of an application.
- · As of April 8, almost \$11.6 million was awarded by FEMA in the City of San Diego, of which about \$3.1 million went to 281 placed households.



- Received assistance = FEMA assistance includes rental assistance, home repair, etc.
- Applied but no assistance indicated = may be a temporary status, such as not yet processed by FEMA or lack of documentation, or the household may not be eligible.
- No record of application = may be due to inability to match the records or households may not have applied due to miscommunication, hesitancy to contact government, etc.

\*Left the program due to own choice or no longer eligible. Rarely, for non-violent offenses, one warning is given for the first Code of Conduct violation and households are asked to leave if there is a second violation.
